The Winter/Spring 2024 KST Presents season promises to bring you **simply the best**. From a **Tina Turner tribute concert** to **Abolitionist Expressions**, a visual art exhibition showcasing incarcerated artists, KST continues to celebrate the **Brave Actions** and **Bold Voices** in our community.

We begin the year with **Youth & Family Programming**. *Justice in Action:* A Celebration of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. gathers performances and activities centering social justice. Later in February, **The Alloy School** returns with new recreational classes for all ages.

Our Winter/Spring **Freshworks Residencies** support new performance in process from three local artists. First, **Caroline Yoo** and **Davine Byon** present *Prophecies & Soy Sauce Shots*, an experiment in storytelling that spans from the past, present to future. Then, **Anna King Skeels** brings *unstitch*, a new performance examining our relationship to our bodies.

The Local & Global Performance series welcomes two weeks of programming from multi-disciplinary artists Edisa Weeks and Mita Ghosal. After a movement workshop, welcome dinner & artist talk, Edisa's April engagement culminates in the Pittsburgh premiere of 3 RITES: Liberty, an excavation into the foundations of Liberty in America. Mita Ghosal's weeklong May programming brings Lost on a Loom to KST's Alloy Studios, examining lost South Asian Histories through Indian textiles and movement.

We can't wait to journey through the winter into the spring with you feeling **warm, inspired, and part of a brave, bold community**.

ABOUT THE WORK

Connected like a puppet to objects that have informed the **Black experience in America**, multidisciplinary artist **Edisa Weeks** alternates between **blackface**, **whiteface**, **storytelling**, **and visceral dance** to dig into the pathologizing of African Americans and the foundations of **Liberty in America**.

3 RITES: Liberty begins with an installation of roots made out of paper and twine that hang from the ceiling to the floor. You are invited to move through the roots as if moving through the underbelly of history before eventually meeting the "Liberty" character played by Weeks. Her hair is braided to resemble the Statue of Liberty's crown. Each spoke of the hair crown is connected via tie-lines and pulleys to specific objects — Bible, black dick, blonde wig, gun, lightbulb, sneakers, watermelon that represent the Black experience in America.

As our nation grapples with confederate monuments, Black Lives Matter, fake news, and economic stratification; *3 RITES: Liberty* humorously and poignantly insists on a reckoning with our past and present.

Immediately after the performance in the theater, we invite you to join **Dr. Kevin Jarbo** for a town hall-style conversation to provide a moment of communal digestion, and to discuss what is resonating with you after experiencing the Liberty rite.

DELIRIOUS Dances - Founded by multi-disciplinary artist Edisa Weeks, DELIRIOUS Dances seeks to erase the barriers between art and life, between performance space and audience space, and between mediums. Edisa Weeks (she/her) - Concept, Choreographer, Performer - is a Brooklyn, NY based educator, choreographer and founder of DELIRIOUS Dances. She creates multimedia interactive work that merges theater with dance to explore our deepest desires, darkest fears and sweetest dreams. She grew up in

Uganda, Papua New Guinea and Brooklyn, NY; and had the joy of performing with: Annie–B Parsons Big Dance Theater, Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Dance Co., Dance Brazil, Homer Avila, Jane Comfort, Jon Kinzel, Muna Tseng, Reggie Wilson Fist & Heel Performance Group, Sally Silvers, Spencer/Colton Dance, among others. She is a recipient of several awards including a 2022 Creative Capital Grant. She teaches choreography, improvisation, dance technique, and mentors emerging artists at Queens College CUNY.

Kevin Jarbo (he/they) - Restorative Justice Facilitator - is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Social and Decision Sciences and Co-Director of the Data-Driven Diversity (D3) Lab in Dietrich College at Carnegie Mellon University where his research focuses on college student engagement, helpseeking behavior, perceptions of

diversity initiatives, and decisions to persist in higher education. He has also worked closely with CMU's Center for Student Diversity & Inclusion to coordinate events that spotlight Black identity development and culture. Outside of his academic work, Kevin has also served as the program chair for the annual Pittsburgh Racial Justice Summit planning committee since 2019.

Besty Chester (she/her) - Lighting Supervisor - Betsy is an NYCbased freelance lighting designer, endlessly fascinated by the ways in which color and shadow can shape a story. She found her passion for lighting after registering for the wrong class and has been enchanted by its magic ever since. Betsy is passionate about creating work that sparks meaningful conversation. She finds inspiration in the way her collaborators experience the story. Having finished three years of grad school without a single cup of coffee, she finds that the energy of a rehearsal room gives her more than caffeine ever could. Most recently, she has designed work for productions with NYU Grad Acting, Tisch Dance, Columbia University, as well as Ayodele Casel + Arturo O'Farrill at the Joyce Theater. Betsy received her MFA in Lighting Design at NYU Tisch School of the Arts in 2021.





Camille Cooper (he/they) - Production Supervisor - is a New York based theatrical technician, puppeteer, and multidisciplinary artist born and raised in Northern New Mexico. While there, they worked with theatres such as the Lensic Performing Arts Center, The Santa Fe Armory for the Arts, and the Adobe Rose Theatre, as well as puppeteered with The Human Beastbox, Meow Wolf, and The New Mexico Museum of Art. In New York, he has puppeteered with entities including Snake in The Boot Collective, Pinc Louds, and, most recently, Concrete Temple Theatre, and works with theatres such as Saint Ann's Warehouse and New York Live Arts. Marýa Wethers (she/her) - Creative Producer - has lived and worked in Lenapehoking (NYC) since 1997. She is a Creative Producer and Independent Curator, currently working with Movement Research as the Director of the GPS/Global Practice Sharing program and with artists Edisa Weeks/DELIRIOUS Dances, OzuzuDances, and Rosy Simas Danse. Curatorial projects include the 2024 Movement Research Festival Embodied Solidarity in Movement(s), the three-week performance series Gathering Place: Black Queer Land(ing) at Gibney Dance (2018), Mount Tremper Arts Watershed Lab Residency (2019 & 2018), the Queer NY International Arts Festival (2016 & 2015), and Out of Space @ BRIC Studio for Danspace Project (2003-2007). Marýa is also a contemporary dancer and received a 2017 NY Dance & Performance ("Bessie") Award for Outstanding Performance with the Skeleton Architecture collective. She graduated from Mount Holyoke College with a BA in Dance, minor in African-American Studies, 1997.

Nathaniel Braddock (he/him) - Sound Environment Composer - leads the Occidental Brothers Dance Band Int'l, the Accra Quartet, Trio Mokili, and also composes for both solo guitar and guitar ensemble. Braddock has collaborated extensively with African artists from Congo, Ghana, Mali, Mozambique, Senegal, Uganda, and Zambia, and with many American and Australian indie rock bands. He has contributed the chapter "African Electrical Networks" to the forthcoming Cambridge Companion to the Electric Guitar (2024). He has collaborated on many new works for dance including 3 RITES: Happiness and Liberty with Edisa Weeks, Khecari Dance, Hedwig Dance, choreographers Liana Percoco and Asimina Chremos, and with Julie Atlas Muz at the 2004 Whitney Biennial in New York. Braddock tours internationally and has performed at the Montreal Jazz Festival, Vancouver Jazz Festival, Chicago Jazz Festival, Music Meeting Nijmegen, Pitchfork Festival, Global Fest, the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, Millennium Park, and many other venues. Violet Asmara Tafari (she/they) - Production Director - is a West Indian, Production Manager and Stage Manager, using the lens of African and Griot teachings to inform her management style. Violet utilizes her ritual and healing background to create fluid ways to support pushing the boundaries of art and the community that embraces it. Violet's work with companies such as AFRIKIN, Syncing Ink, NYSAF, and many others allowed her to navigate the other worlds of theater, music festivals, and a griot's way of storytelling. Using love as her medium it has driven Violet to create her company Freequency Connects, a landing space to provide production support and guidance as artists navigate new pathways, goals, and manifestations of their presented works. You-Shin Chen (she/her) - Set Design - is a New York based Taiwanese scenic designer for live performance and film. Originally born and raised in Taipei, she came to New York to attend NYU Tisch School of the Arts where she received her MFA in 2014. As a theater practitioner and collaborator, You-Shin is committed to diversity and humanity. She centers humans, both the characters and the viewers, and their experiences in her process of creating a three dimensional space. She is always curious about human behaviors within a given space. She thinks about how both tangible and intangible elements shape a space, and how those elements have an effect on the human psyche. You-Shin's scenic design for *Eclipsed* (Berlind Theater) was part of USA exhibition at 2019 Prague Quadrennial. She is the recipient of the 2019 Daryl Roth Creative Spirit Award at The Lilly Awards. She received a Lucille Lortel Awards for Outstanding Scenic Design in 2020, Connecticut Critics Circle Awards in Outstanding Set Design in 2022.
